Welcome from Cllr Louise Gittins



Leader of Cheshire West & Chester Council Chair of the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network (CCIN)



The Network has grown from strength to strength. There are now 119 Members with 23 Supporters

The Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network is the fastest-growing cross-party network in local government. When elected as Chair of the Network at the end of 2022, I followed in the footsteps of Baroness Taylor of Stevenage, recently appointed as Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State in the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government.

The Network was founded in 2012 by Steve Reed OBE MP, now Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, and Jim McMahon OBE MP, Minister of State for English Devolution and Local Government and Baroness Taylor. These three former council leaders came together with a vision of demonstrating the power of cooperation in action in councils and communities and sharing the unique energy that cooperation brings with fellow councillors and their councils. I don't think that, twelve years later, they could have imagined the collaboration and innovation that characterises the Network today.

The Network has grown from strength to strength. There are now 119 Members with 23 Supporters, including Adur, Tamworth, and Peterborough Councils, who, along with Edinburgh and Medway, were Associate Members (as Opposition Groups) and are now transitioning to Full Membership, having taken control of their councils.

Congratulations to former Network Council Leaders Shaun Davies MP (Telford & Wrekin) and Paul Foster MP (South Ribble), who now represent their constituents in Parliament. The new government gives us a fantastic opportunity to push forward and highlight the role of cooperative values in delivering their missions for the country: community energy projects, fair employment, community wealth building and much more. Change is happening, and the future is starting to feel hopeful and full of promise for everyone.

We took the opportunity to send out Congratulations Cards with the latest Case Studies pack to over 150 Leaders, MPs, Elected Mayors, Police and Crime Commissioners after the Elections. These packs demonstrate how cooperative councils work with local people to build strong and resilient neighbourhoods and show what local government achieves daily.

The day after the General Election, I was offered and accepted the incredible opportunity to join the Local Government Association as its first female labour chair. Sadly, as a result, I have only been able to serve one term as Chair of the CCIN. Rest assured, I will continue to advocate for you and work to highlight the fantastic cross-party innovations happening within communities across the UK.

I have had the pleasure of chairing our Executive Oversight Committee, including using our membership subscriptions to fund policy labs and prototypes, giving our Councils the space to innovate without putting scarce council funds at risk. We have developed and launched ground-breaking cooperative policy documents on topics as diverse as Arts and Culture for Social Cohesion, led by North Herts District Council, and 'This is not a Manual on Coproduction' led by Rochdale Council. We also organised a Study Visit to Emilia Romagna, our second overseas visit, where 25 Members and Officers discovered a truly cooperative region for themselves.

We had exhibition stands at the Liberal Democrat and Labour Party Conferences in Autumn 2023. We delivered a groundbreaking Annual Conference hosted by Sunderland City Council in November, which included Plenary sessions on 'Supporting Children and Young People the Cooperative Way' and a 'Cooperative Council's Manifesto for the General Election'. There were 15 workshops led by a range of Network Members and an exhibition supported by our Affiliate Members. The early General Election took its toll on the events in the first half of 2024; noticeably, the LGA Conference did not occur during our Report year.

Progress has been made on the 2024-6 Strategy, which now includes a 'plan on a page' and Key results for the three focus areas: 'A cooperative network comprising cooperative councils working to promote cooperative policy and practice across the country'.

Our cooperative values and principles remain clear and strong, supported by our Values and Principles Board, which has membership from across the cooperative movement. Thank you to all our dedicated V&P Members who are currently supporting 17 live Policy Prototypes and Policy Labs through the delivery and approval process.

Thank you to all those who have contributed to our Network with commitment, energy, and passion for our values over the last two years and the ten years before. Working with such a dedicated core team has been an honour and a privilege. Thank you to Jonathan Downs from Oldham Council, our Accountable Body, who oversees our budget and governance, and finally, a massive thank you to the amazing Nicola Huckerby, who keeps us focused and arranges everything; without her, the Network would not be the one we have today.

Introduction

Borne out of austerity in 2012, the CCIN is today the fastest-growing cross-party Network in local government. As a Special Interest Group of the Local Government Association, we are proud that both councillors and officers are engaged in our work, making it as simple as possible to maximise membership benefits. Our collective work is crucial in facing the cost-of-living crisis and the public sector's financial challenges.

Members of the Network are local authorities committed to reforming their work by building an equal partnership with local people and driving real innovation.

Town, Parish, Community Councils, and Opposition Groups are welcomed as Associate Members. Opposition Groups take control of their councils and are supported through a year of transition to become Full Council Members. Our Affiliate Members are a growing group of values-based non-governmental organisations and corporations wishing to show their support and engage in developing innovative Cooperative Councils.

Being a Network Member has meant sharing our developing good practices and supporting one another by spotlighting our cooperative values and principles. As we enter our second decade, it is clear from discussions that Members

are eager to see more of our cooperative ideas and approaches percolate throughout their organisations to build a movement of cooperative ideals within local government. With the election of a new Government, Members are excited for the opportunity to showcase the difference that the Cooperative Council's approach to service delivery is making in communities. Seeing how the Network has become a focus for creating positive change for the benefit of communities across the UK is inspiring.

Over the last decade, the Network has reinvested more than £400k in membership fees for Memberled policy projects and organised international study visits for Members to experience cooperative working across Europe. As we move forward, it is the perfect time to review how we invest those funds to build a broad range of champions in cooperative service delivery and thematic areas. This will ensure that the learning from this policy work supports council decision-making across the Network. The Network is committed to investing in its Members and working towards creating positive change in the community.

Embedding ownership of this strategy across the Network is critical to creating a cooperative council movement.

CCIN Statement of Values and Principles



Our **Values** are what we believe in

While not a registered cooperative, the Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network has adopted the Cooperative **Values** developed by the International Cooperative Alliance:

Cooperatives are based on the values of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity, and solidarity. In the tradition of their founders, cooperative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility and caring for others.

Our **Principles** guide the way we, and our Members, put our **Values** into action

The Cooperative Councils' Innovation Network endorses the Principles of the International Cooperative Alliance:

- Voluntary and open membership
- Democratic member control
- Member economic participation
- Autonomy and independence

- Education, training, and information
- Cooperation among cooperatives; and concern for community.

In acknowledging that councils are not in themselves registered cooperatives, we and our Members have developed Principles that have grown from those of the International Cooperative Alliance and are relevant within the context of local government:

The icons (right) are used to indicate how Cooperative Councils are putting our Cooperative Principles into practice, demonstrating the 'cooperative difference' in the work that they are doing.

- Social partnership We will strengthen the cooperative partnership between citizens, communities, enterprises, and Councils, based on a shared sense of responsibility for wellbeing and mutual benefit.
- Democratic engagement We will support the active engagement of the full range of residents in decision-making and prioritysetting.
- 3. **Co-production** We will develop systems that enable citizens to be equal partners in designing and commissioning public services and determining public resource use.
- 4. Enterprise and social economy We will promote community-based approaches to economic development that focus on supporting the creation of jobs, social enterprises and other businesses and providing an environment for cooperative and mutual enterprises to thrive.
- Maximising social value We will support the development of a framework and criteria for social value, giving substance to the concept and supporting Councils with the tools to ensure better local social and economic outcomes.
- 6. Community leadership and a new role for councillors – We will explore ways for Councils to act as a platform for helping the community to contribute to local outcomes, and to re-think the role of councillors as community connectors, brokers, and leaders.
- 7. New models of meeting priority needs In exploring new ways of meeting the priority needs of our communities we will encourage models, such as cooperatives and mutuals, which give greater influence and voice to staff and users.

- 8. **Innovation** We will embrace innovation in how we work with local communities to drive positive change.
- Learning We will capture and 'expand'
 the experience and learning from individual
 projects and approaches to encourage
 broader application of cooperative principles
 within individual Member Councils and across
 the Network.
- Walking the talk As a membership organisation, we will make this statement of our principles operational by:
 - Cooperation among Members: Our Members work together to help each other implement our values, sharing experiences and learning
 - Openness of membership: Full, Associate and Affiliate Membership is open to any qualifying Council, organisation or individual who shares our values and is committed to putting them into action
 - Co-production of the Network's work: Members help shape the Network's work programme and the content of events and written products
 - Action-focused: The Network is a vehicle for helping Councils translate cooperative values and principles into policy and practice
 - Membership-based: The Network is majority funded by modest membership subscriptions from its Member Councils, Associates and Affiliates
 - Non-party-political: Members share the belief that working cooperatively within and across communities holds the key to tackling today's challenges



Highlights of the Year

By the end of July 2024, there were 48 Full Council Members, 22 Associate Members (including thirteen Town, Parish, and Community Councils), and 49 Affiliate Members. Members (excluding GMCA and those transitioning from Opposition Groups into Full Council Membership) represent 12.1 million citizens and control a budget of £19.8 billion. There are also 23 Supporters, both individuals and organisations.

CCIN's profile has continued to grow. There has been a steady increase in interest from across the Network in participating in Policy Labs, leading to a broader contribution from Network Members in municipal policy development.



Governance and Structure

The Network is politically led, with elected councillors chairing and forming the Executive Oversight Committee (EOC) and Values and Principles (V&P) Board. Representatives of our Affiliate Membership are also elected to positions on both EOC and V&P. The V&P Board also comprises representatives from the cooperative and trade union sectors.

Elections for places on the Governance panels are held every two years and will be held again in Autumn 2024. To find out more about the process, visit **bit.ly/ccin-eoc**.

Executive Oversight Committee

The Executive Oversight Committee (EOC) holds delegated powers to manage Network affairs on behalf of all Members.

The purpose of the EOC is to:

- Drive forward Cooperative Policy Development on behalf of Network Members.
- Make key decisions on Network priorities, for example, setting the scope of Policy Labs and Policy Prototypes.
- Oversee the development, review, approval and implementation of the CCIN's strategic direction.
- Raise the CCIN's profile, develop our influence and strengthen our policy impact.

- Oversee the Network budget, allocate spending, and sign off on the CCIN's annual accounts.
- Ensure the Values and Principles Board is resourced and supported to perform its functions.
- Manage the Network's reputation, considering issues, including Member behaviour, which may impact the reputation of the CCIN.


Operations Lead and Network Support

Being a Cooperative Council

Council Leaders have identified some key themes and actions councils can take to grow their local economies. This is not an exhaustive list, but it gives a good framework for these activities across our membership.

There are two key themes:

Community Wealth Building

- Develop an Inclusive Economy Charter
- Promote a progressive procurement policy
- Support the creation of a regional mutual/ community bank by investing
- Work with local anchor institutions to buy and recruit local
- Regulate rent and rates for 'local' businesses in council-owned property
- Offer business rate rebates for those businesses that become Living Wage Accredited
- Champion Local Employment schemes
- Have insourcing Council Services as an objective

Cooperative Placemaking

- Develop a cooperative development strategy
- Establish a cooperative development network
- Commit to community engagement in local decision making including participatory budgeting
- Invest in local community production, particularly those focusing on community energy to tackle the climate emergency
- Promote the circular economy
- Support local enterprises to convert into coops/ worker coops
- Have an Asset Transfer policy to manage land and assets which support Community Land Trusts

Funded projects 2024

Each year, CCIN Members can apply to deliver projects on behalf of the Network. Full Councils are encouraged to submit bids for projects that can be delivered in partnership with other Members looking to find cooperative policy solutions to local government challenges. These projects attract up to £20,000. Smaller projects, known as Policy Prototypes, are defined to a specific locality and can attract up to £2,000.

Policy Lab Updates

For 2024, we welcomed Bids from across the Network and approved three Policy Lab Bids:

- Cooperative Values driven AI led by Wigan Council
- 2. BEING Cooperative: towards a model of brave and inclusive governance in local govt led by Rochdale Council
- Taking a Cooperative approach to tackling health inequalities – led by Westminster City Council

In addition, we also increased the budget for the Emilia-Romagna Study Visit, allowing extra delegates to participate



This project was an extension of a Policy Prototype undertaken in Rochdale borough, which developed a toolkit for community engagement. A group of CCIN Councils, Affiliates, and citizens from various places gathered to share their practice and experience around Co-production. Through workshops and enquiries, they developed an encyclopaedia of ideas about how local government is and can engage communities in local democracy. The product is a reflection and a set of tools to help those who want to think and act cooperatively when making things happen together.

The group used the CCIN approach, which challenges Cooperative Councils to put their cooperative principles into practice to demonstrate the `cooperative difference' in their work. The CCIN values and principles have been the filter through which this project was run to enable the group to think about and share approaches to participation, coproduction and democracy that have helped support the work of cooperative councils, the communities they have worked with, and the CCIN Affiliates who participated in this policy lab.

Arts and Culture for Social Cohesion

This project aimed to raise the profile of arts and culture events and activities locally. Culture and the arts can drive development, social cohesion, and change. At the heart of social cohesion is social inclusion. Communities with low social cohesion often need more involvement or access to civic engagement, economic opportunity, and social participation. Supporting the role of culture is vital to building social cohesion.

Culture is essential for avoiding and resolving conflicts. It is an ideal means of communicating across language barriers, empowering people, and facilitating social cohesion, including among refugees, migrants, and host populations. It prevents the marginalisation of people based on their cultural identity, socioeconomic status, age, and other factors.

Study Visit to Emilia-Romagna

The CCIN funded a study visit to Emilia-Romagna. The region is known worldwide for its dense network of cooperatives that contribute to 30% of the region's GDP and involve 2/3rds of the population as Members. Cooperatives in Emilia-Romagna are present in most sectors of the economy, including retail, agribusiness, social services, financial services, insurance, and transportation. Learning from other network members is an important benefit of Network Membership, and this visit allowed elected Members and Officers to see first-hand how a cooperative region operates. During the three-day visit, 25 delegates from across the UK met the Presidents of several Italian cooperatives.

Communications and Marketing

Meetings and events

In July 2023, we kicked off our Coop Option Training with an introduction to alternative business models and the related support landscape. A funded Policy Lab, these online sessions were organised by Kirklees Council and delivered by Stir to Action and Coop Culture. The CCIN funded 84 places across three courses to increase council officers' and other stakeholders' understanding of the 'cooperative option'.

In-depth training was delivered in September and October 2023, covering:

- Finance options to support alternative business models:
- · Governance models.

In the summer of 2023, the CCIN commissioned the Ideas Alliance, an Affiliate Member, engaging Members in one-to-one interviews, online sessions, and two workshops during the Annual Conference.

We had exhibition stands at the Liberal Democrat in Bournemouth and the Labour Party Conference in Liverpool in the Autumn of 2023. Sunderland City Council hosted a groundbreaking Annual

Conference in November, which included Plenary sessions on 'Supporting Children and Young People the Cooperative Way' and a 'Cooperative Council's Manifesto for the General Election'. There were 15 workshops, the most yet, led by a range of Network Members, and an exhibition was supported by our Affiliate Members.

2024 began with a celebration at Westminster City Council following their decision to join the Network with an event involving sector partners. A Fringe event was held at the Labour Local Government Conference at Warwick University in February with the theme 'A Cooperative Council Manifesto for the General Election'. In June, we exhibited at the Cooperative Congress in Birmingham.

The early General Election impacted the number of events in the first half of 2024; noticeably, the LGA Conference was delayed until the Autumn. Traditionally, that event has secured several new Members. The timing of the General Elections also meant many elected Members were naturally focusing on their Constituency and Ward priorities for much of the first six months 2024 and not looking to online events.


Knowledge Hub and WhatsApp Groups



Dynamic Purchasing System (DPS)

In April 2020, the Network launched its DPS. As Cooperative Councils, our Members are at the cutting edge of policy innovation – and it can be a tough place to be. Councils often need to move quickly and flexibly to be on the front foot when it comes to 'doing things differently'. Sometimes it is necessary to bring in extra capacity and specific expertise to do this, and there can also be a need to seek independent challenge to test assumptions and policy design. The CCIN recognises this and wants its Members to be as enabled as possible to develop practical policy solutions as quickly and informed as possible – and this is where the DPS comes in.

A DPS is an entirely electronic system for purchasing goods, works, or services. Unlike a traditional framework, suppliers can apply to join at any time. It is an 'open market' solution designed to give buyers access to a pool of prequalified suppliers.

Our multi-supplier DPS allows all CCIN Members and Associate Members (and the CCIN itself) to select from a specialist, prescribed pool of organisations to help develop policy, implement prototypes and build capacity in communities and inside the organisation.

The DPS period runs from 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2025. The CCIN website has a User Guide and details of who is on the DPS: **councils.coop/dps**.

Strategy and Action Plan 2024-2026

Work to develop the strategy began in 2023 with the commissioning of the Ideas Alliance, one of our Affiliate Members, to develop a collaboratively produced Strategy. Between August and November 2023, the Ideas Alliance held individual meetings, virtual and in-person workshops, and a Member survey to produce the draft Strategy.

The Officer Network has pulled the resulting actions together through regular monthly meetings, a small working group, and online discussions using the LGA Knowledge Hub.

It is clear from discussions so far that all councils are struggling in the face of increasing demand and tightening budgets. More enthusiasm is needed for people to take responsibility for highlighted activities. Whilst Policy Labs and Policy Prototypes funding encourages councils to work

together on common objectives or challenges, work specifically to develop the strategy or to promote the CCIN sits outside the objectives of any one council. A key issue highlighted in the work has been the difficulty of promoting self-reliance within the current structure and the subsequent over-reliance on the CCIN Operations Lead to take any actions forward.


One of the key achievements has been to produce the 'plan on a page' and key results for the three focus areas: 'A **cooperative network** comprising **cooperative councils** working to promote **cooperative policy and practice** across the country'.
